Narrative Writing Prompts for Students, Page 1

1. Imagine you had your own spaceship. Where would you go? Why?
2. Write a story about a kid who got to ride in the first spaceship to Mars. Why are they there? What is going to happen?
3. Imagine you got a hippo for your birthday. What would you do?
4. Continue the story. It was the last night before summer vacation, and our hero should have been asleep but....
5. Imagine that you woke up one day and you were covered in purple spots, head to toe. What would you do? What would happen next?
6. The wicked stepsisters in Cinderella never got a chance to tell their side of the story, so you do it! What was Cinderella REALLY like?
7. Uh oh! You wiped out riding your bike and.... Write what happened next!
8. Continue the story. It was a horrible, no good, very bad day. I knew it was from the moment that...
9. Continue the story. "Well?" the man yelled. "What do you want? You made me..."
10. Pretend the headline in the newspaper read, "'Worst day, ever,' says local teacher." Write the rest of the story! What happened?
11. Continue the story. Once upon a time in a land far, far away there lived...
12. Pretend you are the world's strongest human. What would you do? How strong would you be?
13. What is the craziest dream you have ever had? Turn it into a story!
14. Imagine that cats could talk. What would they say when they were hungry? When they saw a dog?

5. Describe the worst thing you have ever eaten.
6. Describe a science experiment that you have done. What did you do? What happened?
7. Be the expert! Write an instruction manual for something you are good at, whether it is doing a summersault or playing a video game.
8. Write a review for a movie that you watched recently. Describe the characters, setting, and plot. Would you recommend it to a friend?
9. Tell me about a mistake that you learned from.
10. Write a list of advice for a new student on what to do if they don't understand the lesson or homework.
11. Tell me the rules, step-by-step, for how to play your favorite indoor game (like a video game or board game).
12. Tell me about one book that you have read.
13. Write a BREAKING NEWS! story about something that happened in the last week. What happened? Who was involved? What do I need to know?
14. Write a review for a TV show that you watched recently. Describe the characters, setting, and plot. Would you recommend it to a friend?
15. Describe an animal – but don't say what it is! Try to make me guess it.
16. Compare and contrast two places you have visited. How are they the same? How are they different?

You can choose what writing skills you want students to practice during power writing! If you just want silly prompts or getting to know you prompts, we also have those with 65 would you rather and ice breaker writing prompts. This packet includes a total of 365 writing prompts, as well as student writing pages and student fluency charts.
